Home Invaders Want To Do Bad Things To Your Family

The home invasion attempted against the family of NRA First Vice-President Richard Childress can teach us several things.

- The invaders had planned out the attack.
- They knew how to circumvent Childress' security and they were armed.
- Childress did some things right, but there were also things he could have done better in defending his home from invasion.
- The following are 9 lessons we can learn from this incident.

1. Have An Alarm System/Cameras

Detect, delay, defend. These are the three Ds of home defense.

- Alarms and cameras give you reaction time.
- Cameras allow you to identify the attackers.

2. Carry Your Weapon At Home

A recent survey found that 47% of licensed CCW holders carry only occasionally or not at all.

- Carry everywhere, including at home.
- Having your weapon on you when a home invasion occurs can save your life and the lives of your family members.

3. Trust Your Gut

Childress heard a noise and investigated.

- Even when his wife told him to go back to sleep, Childress instead took action.
- Trusting his gut saved Childress' life and his family members' lives.

4. Know Your Rules Of Engagement

Know the law so you don't get arrested.

- Does your state have Castle Doctrine?
- Know when you can legally use deadly force and you'll stay out of prison.

5. Keep Weapons Staged And Ready

Keep weapons CONSISTENTLY at the ready.

- This will better prepare you for a "startle" wake-up.

6. Have A Home Defense PLAN

Childress didn't have a plan.

- A home invasion is chaos and adrenaline.
- Have a plan you can follow when groggy or surprised. This saves reaction time.

7. Create Layers Within Your Home For Reactionary Gap

Create multiple barriers to give you more time to react and create more obstacles to threats.

- Lock your doors and windows!
- Have a way to answer the door without opening it.

8. Maximize Your Ammo

Have extra mags and use effective loads so you can neutralize the threat.

9. Know When To Call Police

Call right away when a threat presents itself – not AFTER you're done shooting!

Prepare. Train. Survive.
