The Balisong Or Butterfly Knife

This knife has a long history in popular culture.

- Most people associate the butterfly knife with the Philippines. There's some speculation that the design actually predates this association, but the specifics aren't important.
- Balisongs have a sketchy legal history in parts of the United States, and at various times it has been difficult to get them.
- In Buck Greene's home state of New York, these were once misinterpreted as "gravity knives," although a balisong is not a gravity knife.
- Cold Steel even marketed a knife called the Paradox that was not a balisong but looked like one (and they had a tri-folder that was probably a gravity knife).
- In an era of tactical folders, the balisong is kind of "old tech," but it actually has 5 great reasons to recommend it.

It's Self-Contained

While you can get sheaths for balisongs, there's no need for one.

- Like a folding knife, the balisong requires no sheath. This makes it simple to conceal and deploy, such as from a jacket pocket or back pants pocket.
- When closed, the knife is completely safe, and the blade is entirely enclosed by the handle (without even the spine exposed).

The "Lock" is Very Strong

One of the big disadvantages of a folding knife is that the lock could fail, injuring you.

• Balisongs don't have a "lock" as such.

- Some don't even sit flat all the way when they're open. The blade is held open by the power of your hand on the handles.
- I've never heard of a balisong breaking at the pivot, and I don't think I've ever seen a story of a balisong failing in a way that could injure the user.
- The butterfly knife is therefore one of the safest of all folding knives.

It's A Great Kubotan Or "Pocket Stick"

The size and shape of the closed butterfly knife make it a good striking tool.

- You can hit with the "flat" of the handle halves or strike with the end of the knife.
- The pivot end is a particularly nasty "skull crusher" type striking surface.

It's Easily Concealed

The balisong is flat and relatively small.

- The flat, symmetrical shape makes the knife comfortable for "deep concealment" and easy to slide into a pocket.
- At one time there were even balisongs designed to look like two pens sitting next to each other.

It's Quick To Open

And no, you don't have to open it "the pretty way."

- While it's fun to learn complicated opens and spins, there's no need to do that.
- You can flip the knife open and over once and it's instantly open.
- The balisong can also be opened directly into a reverse grip with one move.
