- Keep track of what you use and carry what you use frequently.
- Find gear that is multipurpose so you don't have to carry too much.
- The average American male can carry 30 to 40 pounds in a backpack at most.
- Never leave behind the stuff that could save your life, though.

Should what you have in your vehicle and pack/ruck be seen as one's primary gear, and what one has on his person be seen as his secondary gear, which will afford all options of mission success? Or is it the other way around?

- Primary gear is what you can carry on your person.
- Your vehicle is an accessory, a means to get to your destination.
- You will fall back on your baseline equipment, as in what you are carrying.

What are the best all around on the go (SHTF) knife sharpeners?

- Consider the **Gossman Survival Tool**, it's a piece of D2 steel that can be used for splitting.
- The Fallkniven DC3 and DC4 are also good.
- You can also use wet/dry sandpaper (600/800/1000/1500/2000) and a mousepad or a piece of leather.
